I am the “inbetween” minister ministering with you as you search for a new minister to whom you will extend a call next year. have the virus, but I manage to keep from an outbreak by paying attention to stress. Paying attention is the key to living with the stress and constancy of change.

During the month of September, I would like to pay attention to what is happening at UUCP. I want to go to at least one meeting of each group that meets under the auspices of UUCP. Don’t hesitate to invite me to your meeting or event! The reason I like to go to every meeting in the initial months of an interim is so I might learn your ways and join you in the efforts you choose as a congregation. I need to get a good picture of who you are before I know where to lend my efforts. I work from the assumption that I must have clear goals in order to accomplish anything. I am here to accomplish what you have asked me to do.

The main accomplishment I hope I will be able to meet adequately is the goal of “walking together.” I

first encountered this term, “walking together,” when I was learning what it means to be a Unitarian Universalist. The Reverend Conrad Wright wrote extensively on the meaning of our way of religion as “walking together.” Typical of our way of religion, we reflect upon ordinary human activity to speak about the deeper quality of the human spirit. I hope that you will join me in September as I enter into a covenant with you for the coming year so we might glean all the riches available to us in this walk we are about to embark upon together.

I await our September ingathering, where we will celebrate with the annual Water Communion. Together, we will cross both stormy and calm seas this year. We shall walk in beauty, touch hands, grow to love more deeply, face fear with courage, fail, go on, and succeed. - all the while attending to one another.

Some Assembly is Required

Welcome, and welcome back. Welcome first to our interim minister, Rev. Roberta Haskin, who has been on duty since mid August but officially will be “in the pulpit” for the first time at our ingathering ceremony on September 9. She is an accredited interim minister and comes to us after finishing a year in Las Vegas, where she was very well regarded. I am confident that this will be another good year of ministry as our Search Committee presses on in its work.

Welcome also to those who have been traveling and are now returning to relative normalcy. Of course, not all of us escaped, so thanks to the Sunday Services Committee for the programs that have engaged us this summer. At one of those services, some of us who attended the UU General Assembly in Portland described highlights that struck us as most meaningful. Let me reproduce here the opening words from that service:

Some assembly is required.

Why do assemble in this place, at this time?

We come together to find meaning,
to discover what to us is most sacred.

We come together as a free people, knowing that to live is to choose, and that our choices matter.

We come together because we are mortal, and to celebrate life, each life, as precious.

We come together because we are alone. That is our fate as humans. But to be fully human, we cannot remain solitary.

We must come together.

Some assembly is always required.

The “assembly” phrase, used by Robert Fulghum in a recent essay, works because it metaphorically applies the common box cover advisory to our reason for existing as a congregation. In kind of a double twist, we should recognize that the advisory also applies pretty much straight up. There is a lot of assembling going on. We are improving parts of our building and our organizational procedures to keep us healthy. During August, we improved the drains from the air conditioning system that have plagued us with dripping ceilings for many years. We have also arranged for the doors and windows to be replaced as the first stage of our renovation program, and this project should begin in early October. At our Board retreat on September 8, we will be looking at ways to identify more effectively the talents and interests of our members so that we can keep UUCP and its ministries functioning well. On September 29, we will be assembling our congregational calendar for the year, attempting for the first time in my memory to coordinate prospectively our many activities such that they cohere and not conflict. We are trying hard to put our Legos together.

The body of those opening words come from an observation by Denny Davidoff that being human means dealing with four challenges: meaning, freedom, mortality, and solitude. UUCP exists in large part because most of us find some of our meaning in working toward a goal with people we care

about. The meaning and the pleasure come from both the work and the communion. Our job as a Board is to help people find their common interests and give them the resources to do good things together. The doing, however, is an active process. Get involved. Some assembly is required.

To Share Our Strength in Fellowship . . .

At the risk of sounding redundant, once again here's a primer about covenant groups (also known as small group ministry--don't let the name "covenant" scare ya!)

A covenant group is a small group that includes no more than 10 participants. Groups meet twice a month to share in life's joys and struggles, to deepen connections to each other and the community, and to encourage spiritual growth. The meeting format is simple and predictable: an opening reading, a check-in followed by a focused discussion, a check-out or sharing of likes and wishes, and a closing reading. The group decides on its meeting place, time and subjects at its initial meeting as well as forms the group's covenant for the year. The groups remain open until the magic number of 10 is reached and last throughout a program year.

Meaning

Here is a brief description of each curriculum being offered this year. Tell your friends – it's going to be a rocking year at the UUCP!

NURSERY

AWorld of Friends – Tiffany and Daniel continue to provide a safe and predictable routine for our youngest UU's.

PRE-K – KINDERGARTEN (4-6 YEARS OLD)

Treasure Hunting is the theme that

creates a concrete way for children to become involved in the excitement of the search for the meaning of life.

1ST - 2ND GRADE (6-7 YEARS OLD)

Free To Believe explores UU principles and sources while nurturing the social, emotional and spiritual lives of children.

3RD - 4TH GRADE (8-9 YEARS OLD)

Holidays & Holy Days teaches children about the origins and meanings of holiday and holy day celebrations

5TH - 6TH GRADE (10 – 11 YEAR SOLD)

Bibleodeon introduces Hebrew and Christian scriptures by presenting the best-known Hebrew and Christian stories through interactive challenges. Students explore connections between biblical events and UU principles, and between biblical ideas and their own lives.

7TH - 8TH GRADE (12-14 YEARS OLD)

Junior YRUU/Fighting Invisible Tigers This class will focus on creating a trusting community focused on discussing issues important to the lives of its participants. The "Fighting Invisible Tigers" curriculum helps teens discover how to manage stress in their lives. The remainder of the year will use a small group ministry format of an opening reading, check-in, a focused discussion, and a closing reading.

9TH - 12TH GRADE (14-18 YEARS OLD)

Senior High/YRUU

Our high school group, Young Religious Unitarian Universalist will meet regularly on Sunday mornings for worship, fellowship, and all around fun! Like the "junior" YRUU group (7th-8th grade), the senior high group will follow a small group ministry format with topics chosen and led by the group.

(lesbian, gay, bi, transgender, queer or intersex)

Do you like sharing your story and discussing the interesting questions that 7-8th graders might ask you about finding out, coming out, your journey, your struggle, your celebration? This panel complements OWL's diversity, orientation and identity sessions, and will be lead in to our discussions surrounding relationships and commitment. Renovation Task Force Update

A quick note to let you all know what has been happening with the facilities and construction progress.

NEW DOORS THIS FALL!

First, we'll let you know about what you're likely to see in the near future. As was discussed at the annual meeting in June, there has been progress with respect to getting glass doors and windows replaced. We received a permit from the Town of Paradise Valley and have signed a contract with Porter Construction. Doors and windows will be replaced as follows:

- All glass adjacent to patio along Lincoln (kitchen, Johnson Rm., etc.)
- Current entry
- Sanctuary / meditation garden
- Automatic door at North end of West wing

Some notes: All sliding doors converted to hinged doors; Automatic opening doors will be at current location AND sanctuary/patio doorway; All materials are as currently specified on architectural plans; Only work that will be "undone" is current front entrance and those materials will be re-used or maintained as replacement.

The estimated cost of this work is \$125K and could begin as soon as the first weekend in October. Gene Rowley is coordinating all work with the schools and contractor to minimize disruption to school programming. In a great example of the

community-building that a project like this represents and engenders, the schools are involved in targeted fundraising to help defray the costs of this portion of the project.

FAWNING NEW AWNINGS

With all of the doors and windows on the patio being replaced, the condition of the awnings begs to be addressed. Terry Simmons is coordinating this project. This is something that we enjoy not only on Sunday morning and afternoon, but the shade helps with energy consumption by reducing heat gain in the West wing throughout the week. This is a cost that will be budgeted regularly (roughly every 5 years) and is currently estimated at \$3.5-5.5K.

GOODBYE INDOOR WATERFALLS

Another project that is long overdue relates to the puddles that frequently appear in the hall of the West wing. This occurs because the drainage for 8 air handlers is currently routed into one line. The condensation will now be handled by a dedicated drain for each air handler. The estimate for this work (including ceiling repair) is \$8K.

It is exciting to see the efforts of so many dedicated volunteers (and donors) finally being realized. Give someone a pat on the back or a hug and share a congratulatory cup of coffee.

SIDEWALK UPDATE

During the spring, we began learning about and talking about the Paradise Valley sidewalk project

planned for Lincoln Dr. That work is currently scheduled to reach us no earlier than December 2007. We are still pursuing answers with regard to when the bill will arrive and whether we'll benefit from the grant that exists for this project. We are talking to the Town of PV about coordinating that work with the planned frontage improvements (including new signage) called out for in the planned construction.

TOWN NEWS

That brings us to the status of the plan approval process with Town. The Town Planning Commission has "work sessions" before any meetings where they consider their recommendation to the Town Council. We've had two of those "work sessions" this summer. There has been good discussion and the Town is appreciative of our professional approach. We have learned what the current hot buttons are with the Town Planning Commission (traffic, lighting and landscaping) and our design meets or exceeds all Town standards. Another result of the work sessions is that our application for an amendment to the special use permit (it's what allows us to exist as a congregation on these premises in the Town of PV) is on track to be handled as one complete package – saving time (and money) as we begin to move into construction and consider workable construction packages. The Town planning staff will present their review of the complete package at a Planning Commission work session on September 4.

PROJECT FUNDING

Funding for the door/window replacement and sidewalk is coming from the Capital Building Fund; funding for the A/C and awning repairs is from the operating accounts. We have enough in our Capital Building Fund and our reserves to cover these costs, but it is critical that we keep up with our pledges - both Stewardship and Capital Building Campaign. We are making tangible improvements to our property, and in so doing are keeping the promise we have made to each other, to those who came before and to those who will come after us.

We appreciate the recent efforts of Gary Ezzell, Smoot Carl-Mitchell and Sandy Weir (representing us at the Town along with the architect, Doug Sydnor), Don Weir (developing funding options for construction) and Gene Rowley and Terry Simmons for their project leadership.

And again thanks to all of you for your support, questions and contributions. We are making progress and I hope we can all agree that we are making progress that makes sense.

To all UUCP Contributors,

The Finance Committee appreciates your patience as we develop our processes within the new accounting system. A good faith effort has been made to enter the corrections you have provided. The Finance Committee has also reviewed the existing pledge entries and contribution transactions to spot errors. All corrections were approved at the June Finance Committee meeting.

As you review the mailed statement, please note that:

- Contributions from you between 7/1/06 and 6/30/07 are considered payments toward your 2006-7 fiscal year pledge unless they were specifically designated as an 2007-8 contribution.
- Contributions from you after 6/30/07 will be considered payments against your 2007-8 fiscal year pledge.
- If your 2006-7 fiscal year pledge is not completed by 6/30/07 it will be "written off" so the records for the year may be closed out. Of course, the contributions are still welcome, but they will be applied to your 2007-8 fiscal year pledge.
- Pledge statements will only report contributions up to your pledge amount. If you pay in excess of your pledge in any fiscal year, it will be reported

as a non-pledge contribution on your end of year statement. However, this year's statements still reflect pledge overpayments that will be applied to next year.

Thank you for your understanding as we continue our quest for an accurate and open accounting system.
