Minister's Musings

There are times when life presents us with such tragedy that we cannot help but raise our hands in helplessness asking "Why?" At the end of July, we Unitarian Universalists experienced that feeling as we learned that a man struggling with burdens including mental illness and unemployment came into the Tennessee Valley Unitarian Universalist Congregation in Knoxville, TN during a children's performance and began shooting. A letter found in his truck explained that he hated liberals and gays and blamed these groups for his difficulties. Two people, Greg McKendry and Linda Kraeger, were killed and seven others injured. McKendry acted quickly and bravely, tackling the gunman, Jim Adkisson. He and the other church members who acted quickly kept Adkisson pinned to the ground saving countless lives.

This month, on Saturday, September 13th, we will memorialize the 45th anniversary of the church bombing at the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama. This attack was meant to inspire fear and to protest the segregation of public places, which were some of the first hard won victories of the civil rights movement. The bombing took the lives of four young ladies (ages 11 to 14) who were in the church for a Sunday School class. John Henry Waddell's statue group "That Which Might Have Been," dedicated to the young women, has had a home here at UUCP for over 40 years.

Beyond these national and historical tragedies, our congregation has experienced personal and tragic losses over the past few months, and the past few years. These are experiences that lead us to ask, "Why on earth do these things happen?" and "How can life, and how can people do these terrible things?"

As your minister, I wish I could offer an easy answer to these questions. I cannot. These are the sufferings of life that humanity has wrestled with throughout the ages. The wrestling did not begin with Job, and it does not end with us. All I do know, is that in the midst of loss and injustice, there is something saving, something hope giving, something that gives us power not only to respond but to live again--and that is community.

Community has the potential to call us to the best in ourselves. It has the power to remind us that even in our darkest times, life has more to offer us, that there is hope. Of course, community also has the potential to rally us around fear, small-mindedness and hate--essentially the worst in ourselves. Throughout this month, in worship, we will be looking at community--and the ways in which our community can be a place that offers us hope in difficulty, courage in facing injustice, encouragement and challenge in living our beliefs, and an opportunity to deepen our lives.

I am grateful to be joining my life and my ministry with yours. In all the joys and sorrows that life brings, in all the ways that we will come to share celebration and grief, let us remember the goodness and love we find in being together.

From the President...

This summer has brought excitement and joy at the arrival of our new minister, Reverend Susan Frederick-Gray, and her family, mixed with deep sorrow at the loss of three current or former members and the Knoxville tragedy. The losses remind us of the solace to be found in a religious community—in our beloved community—at difficult and even heart-breaking times. We were particularly fortunate to have Reverend Susan with us at these difficult times with the promise of renewal as well as consolation.

As fall approaches, we are called upon to tend to our community and to our shared ministry with each other and with Reverend Susan, while working to become more effective in the broader community. During September, we have three opportunities to further those goals:

- In-gathering Sunday, September 7, 2008, is our first with Reverend Susan. Donations collected during that service will be forwarded to the Knoxville congregations to assist them in their recovery from this summer's tragic assault.
- The following weekend, UUCP will be hosting a commemoration of the 45th anniversary of the church bombing in Birmingham that resulted in the deaths of the four girls who are the subject of the statuary in our garden—That Which Might Have Been. It is an opportunity to recall the

hard battles fought to improve civil rights in this country and to champion ongoing struggles for civil rights in our country.

- On Friday, September 19, there will be an all-Congregation meeting facilitated by our District Executive, Ken Brown. The meeting is an opportunity to share feelings about the new ministry we have embarked upon and a chance to share our vision about the shared ministry with Reverend Susan.

As we cope with our personal struggles, may we take the time to renew our commitment to one another, to our beloved community, to our shared ministry with Reverend Susan, and to the broader world. May it be so.

BOARD APPROVES TO OPPOSE PROP 102

The UUCP Board has approved a resolution on behalf of UUCP as a Welcoming Congregation to **oppose** Proposition 102 on November 4, 2008. If approved by Arizona voters, Prop102 will amend the Arizona Constitution by adding: Marriage - Only a union of one man and one woman shall be valid or recognized as a marriage in this state.

UUCP will continue active involvement **opposing** Prop 102 from now through the election.

UUCP CHILDREN'S MINISTRY WELCOMES REV. SUSAN!

We are incredibly excited to welcome Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray to the UUCP and to our Children's Ministry program. Rev. Susan and I have been working together to establish a calendar of intergenerational worship services. She has a wonderful repertoire of intergenerational worship services designed to bring all ages into the worship experience. The nursery will still be open during these services for our youngest children. Our first inter-

generational worship service will be the "gathering of the waters" on September 7, 2008.

UU PALS TO KICK-OFF ANOTHER YEAR OF INTERGENERATIONAL COMMUNITY BUILDING

Ann-Marie Ciemny is coordinating our successful UU Pals program this year. The UU Pals program matches an adult with a child in our congregation. We hope that our adults will experience the joy of getting to know one of our wonderful UU kids and that our children will learn more about developing relationships. The program runs throughout the "school" year (fall to spring). Several special events have been planned for the UU Pals in order to facilitate the development of your relationship. These activities are optional, but highly recommended. The time commitment is 1 to 2 hours per month; of course, the sky is the limit. Adults and children are asked to complete a UU Pal application form, which can be found on the Children's Ministry registration table throughout September. A special Together Time devoted to UU Pals will be presented on September 21, 2008.

CHALICE LIGHTERS NEEDED

The beginning of a new program year brings the children back into the sanctuary most Sundays, which presents many opportunities for the honor of lighting the chalice. Children up to the age of 18 are invited to sign-up for one or more Sundays at the following Doodle link:

Lighting the chalice is a great way to mark a child or youth's birthday or another special event in the family. Parents are encouraged to assist children under six years old in lighting the chalice.

2008-2009 SUNDAY SCHOOL- UU IDENTITY

The Children's Ministry curricula alternate between focusing on UU Identity or the "Six Sources of Our Living Tradition" from year-to-year. This year is a UU identity year. The curricula from Pre-K through 8th grade are briefly described below. Please see the gold Children's Ministry brochure for a more complete description. The nursery will be open from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. beginning September 7th, and YRUU will follow its own youth led program at 10:30 a.m. on Sunday mornings.

Pre-K – Kindergarten (4-6 years old) – Chalice Children is designed to help young children learn about their congregation and their congregation through rituals, rhymes, chants, stories, and activities.

1st - 2nd Grade (6-7 years old) – Rainbow Children

This is anti-bias, pro-diversity curriculum addresses racial and ethnic prejudice while affirming the inherent worth and beauty of the child, the family, the community, and the diversity of humankind.

Children's Ministry...

3rd - 4th Grade (8-9 years old) – UU Superheroes

UU Super Heroes by Gaia Brown is the curriculum that will be used for this class. UU Super Heroes is a values-based Unitarian Universalist identity curriculum that encourages children to explore the lives of famous people who were Unitarians, Universalists, or Unitarian Universalists.

5th - 6th Grade (10-11 years old) – The Questing Year engages 5th-6th graders in four different quests connected through the central themes and purposes of faith development and social action and a greater understanding of their beliefs and their faith with respect to Unitarian Universalism.

7th - 8th Grade (12-14 years old) – Coming of Age

Coming of Age (COA) is a special rite of passage in our Unitarian Universalist tradition. COA candidates will embark on a year of discovery about their Unitarian Universalist heritage along with visiting houses of worship of other faith traditions. Candidates are required to complete 24 hours of community service, to prepare a worship service, and to write an essay about their journey that will be presented at a graduation service in May. All 7th-8th graders are invited to participate in the Sunday morning curriculum even if they opt out of the requirements for graduation.

YRUU NEWS


YRUU is an acronym for Young Religious Unitarian Universalists,

9:00 a.m. - viewing "The Children's March," a 40 minute film produced by Teaching Tolerance that gives historical background to the Sixteenth Street Baptist Church and the children of Birmingham's role in the struggle for civil rights. This event will be intergenerational and suitable for children.

3:00 p.m. - Viewing "Four Little Girls," a documentary by Spike Lee about the bombing: includes interviews with the victims' family and friends. This event is more appropriate for older youth and adults. **CHILDCARE WILL BE PROVIDED FROM 3-5 P.M.**

6:00 p.m. - "The Love That Forgives" worship service/vigil led by Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray; music by Brenda Combs and our choir; a candlelight vigil in the statuary garden. "The Love That Forgives" was the Sunday school lesson planned for that day, 45 years ago. This event is appropriate for all ages.

There will be light refreshments at 5 o'clock, prior to the service for those attending the 3 o'clock program.

Many UU and other faith communities, the mayor and vice mayor of Paradise Valley, and the George Washington Carver museum have been invited to participate in this commemorative day. We hope our UUCP community will have a strong showing as well.

WHO ARE THE TRANSYLVANIAN UNITARIANS?

HOW DID WE GET A PARTNER CHURCH?

WHAT IS HAPPENING HERE IN OCTOBER?

Unitarianism began in 1568 in a part of present-day Romania known as Transylvania, with the enactment of the Edict of Torda that codified the principle of religious toleration. The history of Unitarianism there is marked by oppression, however. As a result the religion relied on an almost “underground” mentality focused on preserving the original ideas that distinguished Unitarianism from other religions. Some of these key ideas include the humanity of Jesus and Mary, and the rejection of the trinity—thus the name “Unitarianism.” This oppression in Eastern Europe continued through the era of the Iron Curtain, unlike Unitarianism in the western world where Unitarian theology grew and flourished with open discourse on religious and spiritual matters. So—the Unitarianism in Eastern Europe

today is much more conservative than elsewhere.

After the fall of the socialist regimes in Eastern Europe in the late 1980s, the way was clear for Unitarians there to resume freer contact with other Unitarians around the world. Initial contacts clarified just how beneficial this could be, from a material as well as spiritual perspective. Thus the Partner Church movement was born, to match congregations in Hungary and Romania with congregations in the US. The program has since been expanded to include over 200 congregations all over the world and is managed via the UUA’s Partner Church Program.

UUCP took advantage of this opening in 1991 to formalize a partner church relationship with a young minister that some of our members (Ray and Gretchen Manker, Paula Kulina, Ernie Garcia) had befriended during visits to Romania. We learned that Rev. Domi Rusz was entering the post-communist era with a tremendous responsibility: build a new church and community center in a large town, Szekelyudvarhely. Suffice it to say that it is a dramatic story that is a testament to perseverance. UUCP played a role in this story, providing funds and moral support over the decade it took to complete the project. The greatest water use in your home comes from your bathroom. According to thegreenroutine.net, The average bath tub holds 42 gallons of water. Some larger tubs, sold as garden, soaking, or whirlpool tubs hold 80 gallons or more. The average shower head is rated at 2.5 gallons per minute, or gpm. The average person showers for about 8 minutes. Bringing the water usage of an average shower to 20 gallons. So in the average home, and for the average showerer, the shower conserves more water than the bath.' If you take extra long showers, you may want to stop your tub during the shower to see just how much water you use. If you have an older home, update your shower head.
