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Minister's Musings

It's February—what a beautiful month in Arizona! I understand why millions of people live in Phoenix. I am happy to be one of them!

I am now officially installed as your minister and we have had 6 months together of shared ministry. They have been wonderful months. However, even after six months, I still sometimes feel on Sunday morning as I shake hands, give hugs and exchange smiles that I will never know all your names! I suspect some of you may feel that way too.

When I came here in April last year as your candidate, I talked about my desire to meet with many of you in small groups, to hear your stories, to get to know you, to hear what you love about this congregation and what your hopes and dreams are for it. Instead, I found I didn't have the slow entry I had hoped. Instead, we had losses of loved ones to mourn, great celebrations to host, such as our Partner Church guests from Transylvania and our Birmingham Memorial event, and so many new people. It has been a great, but busy first 6 months.

However, as our congregation grows, it becomes that much more important that we create ways to have more intimate community and connection. We need ways to know one another and be known, opportunities to share and explore our spiritual yearnings and experiences. Covenant groups are a great way to do this.

In early February, I will visit Unity Church-Unitarian in St. Paul, Minnesota. Unity has one of the best models of Covenant Group ministry and I will be going to learn more about their program. In March, I will lead a "come and see" introduction to Covenant groups to introduce what they are and why they are important. The event will be designed specifically for people who are interested in facilitating a Covenant Group (see more details elsewhere in this Horizons) Most important to the Covenant group process is the need for facilitators, so I invite anyone who is interested in Covenant Group facilitation to come to this event on March 14th.

My hope is that over the course of the spring, I will be able to meet with groups in the church, and not

in just in the context of committee meetings, but as an opportunity for learning more of the history and vision you all have for UUCP. In the meantime, if you would like the opportunity to share some of your story with me, please call or email me. I welcome the chance to hear your stories and learn from them. Over the years of ministry we will share, I look forward to getting to know you better and more deeply.

UUCP is Moving to 2 Services! Trial Run begins March 1, 2009

WORSHIP TIMES: 9:30 AM AND 11:15AM

Everyone hold onto your hats! We are going to experiment with a trial run of having 2 services on Sunday mornings, beginning March 1, 2009. The services will be at 9:30am-10:30am, and one at 11:15-12:15pm. There will be a coffee hour after each service, but the coffee hour after the first service is open to second service attendees as well. Children's Religious Education class will be held during the 9:30 am service, with a Children's Fellowship hour for multiple ages during the 11:15am service. Nursery care will be provided throughout the morning and during both services.

At our feedback session, someone had a great suggestion. Keep your mind open for at least 6 weeks. My hope is to have another input session at the end of April, an opportunity to check in on how the trial is going and how it might be improved.

We will return to one service during the summer, beginning June 28th, at 10:30am.

Are You Interested in Facilitating a Covenant Group?

“COVENANT GROUPS: WHAT, WHY AND HOW”

What are Covenant Groups?

Covenant Groups are 6-10 people who meet regularly for spiritual reflection and sharing. Meeting topics focus on spiritual and life issues, such as loss, forgiveness, God, and sabbath. Members of the group make a commitment to share deeply and to build connections closely. Unlike other groups, the purpose is not an activity, nor intellectual. It is intended to create the space to explore our deeper human questions of meaning.

Each group has a trained facilitator and group members create a covenant (a sacred promise) to abide by the rules of their own group. The facilitator and the covenant help create the kind of sacred space that welcomes sharing and exploration. The groups meet for a defined amount of time, for example, twice a month for 5 months.

Covenant group facilitators are people who:

- Have good people skills
- Are genuinely interested in helping people to become spiritually engaged with one another
- Can feel comfortable learning

to guide group dynamics in positive ways

- Are comfortable being primarily responsible for the administrative details of group meetings
- Are reliable
- Support the covenant group model

As I wrote in November, our continuing growth is exciting and increases opportunities to effect change within and beyond our religious community. By the time this column appears, Reverend Susan Frederick-Gray installation will have just been held with much joy and fanfare.

The Renovation Committee has also carefully evaluated ways to move forward on further renovation in light of numerous competing demands and proposed ways to address those demands in the form of four motions. Documentation regarding the Renovation has been posted on our website and three workshops held to inform our membership about the decisions to be made at the mid-year congregational meeting. At that meeting, the Congregation is being asked to approve the four motions to continue progress on further renovating our campus (we replaced most of the doors and windows in the main building a little over a year ago dramatically improving safety, accessibility, and aesthetics). The first motion sets forth conditions to finance further renovation, while the remaining motions identify crucial, if not glamorous, work that is necessary to update our campus for health, safety, accessibility and, ultimately, space. Regardless of the outcome on the

motions, significant human and financial capital will be required in the coming months to prepare for a capital campaign and to accomplish other steps integral to improving our campus and welcoming even more to our campus and community.

May we be guided by our principles and values--and our regard for one another--as members of a beloved religious community as we continue in this process. May it be so.

I am an OPEN person, who wants to get to know others.


I am a COURTEOUS person, who relieves others of the struggle of trying to remember all our names.

From the Renovation Committee...


Renovation is a long-term commitment and we have been at this formally since 2003. The good news is that we don't have a commitment problem.

The Renovation Committee is pursuing several things while we prepare for construction.

We have begun a process assessing our capacity for raising money in a capital campaign. This, along with the sense of the congregation arising from the February 1 meeting and our ability to build capital cash reserves will determine our timeline and scope for construction.

We are also building a "case statement" that will describe not only to potential lenders, but to us, what the project will entail and how it's consistent with our mission and strategic plan.

Another task to which we can all relate is a focus on parking. The Renovation Committee will continue to consider options for decreasing the impact of our limited parking coupled with increased needs for parking. While we are looking at all options, there is one to which we can each contribute – carpooling/ridesharing could significantly ease the strain on Sunday morning parking and this is consistent with a goal the Green Sanctuary Committee has been pursuing.

What an exciting way to start the New Year! UUCP's exhibit of the **Artists of the Black Community (ABC/AZ)** now fills the walls of our sanctuary in all its power, boldness and emotion.


A wonderful group of black artists showed up on January 3, 2009 to bring their work and stayed to assist the Sanctuary Team with the hanging. We all had a great time and the results speak for themselves.

The work of twelve African American artists is represented in this exhibit, which includes oil and acrylic paintings on canvass and wood, lithographs, serigraphs, black and white and color photography, silver gelatin, chalk, pastel and charcoal drawing. A special display on the west wall is a digital photo montage by Stephen Marc. Also, while UUCP does not encourage artists to enter three dimensional work (due to our inability to ensure its safety), this display does include the semi-3D work of two artists. Khandra Howard combines ceramics with wood and Archie Coles creates assemblages.

A number of the artists are known nationally and internationally, including our own long-term member, Dr. Eugene Grigsby. Other artists whose work is displayed are Rip Woods and daughter Dee Dee Woods, Jacque Venus Tobias, Larry Wilson, William Palmer, Marc Herring, Richard Retter and Stevo Swindle.

Be sure to see this exhibit. It opened on January 4, 2009 and will remain on our walls until March 7, 2009. Many of the artworks are for sale and some are very reasonably priced.


